On January 30, 2022, Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) officers responded to a homicide in the City of Wilmington, California. Officers discovered the victim, 36-year old David Ulloa, suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. Los Angeles City Fire Department pronounced the victim deceased.

As part of the LAPD South Bureau Homicide Division investigation, 32-year-old Francisco Real of Long Beach was identified as the suspect in the murder of Ulloa. Detectives were able to track Real's movements to Pullman, Washington. The Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office filed one count of 187(a) P.C. Murder against Francisco Real and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

LAPD detectives contacted Sergeant Breshear of the Quad City Task Force (QCTF) and asked for assistance in locating Real. Sergeant Breshear and QCTF were able to locate Francisco Real in an apartment complex located in the City of Pullman.

After receiving this information, on March 7, 2022, the Whitman County SWAT Team executed a search warrant at Real's apartment. Suspect Real was subsequently taken into custody. In

Resumed Events and Experiences

- Hosted 6 Concerts in the Park with new mobile stage setup.
- Hosted 4 Friday night Movies in the Park.
- Re-opened the Senior Center June 2021.
 - Hired Lendi Bankhead as the Senior Center Coordinator (Sept. 2021).

Parks Upgrades

- Mary's Park
 - ADA accessible playground features and surface.

- Gravity sanitary sewer extension to new terminal (completed in 2021): \$2.4 million (includes \$1.6 million state grant).

- New terminal (design start 2021, completion 2023).
- Airport Road Conceptual Design (start February 2021), targeting major improvements in 2024-25.
- Extend City's NE-High water pressure system/zone to the airport and the area surrounding the airport (2023 timeframe).




COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Planning and GIS




- Adoption of GIS for the City of Pullman

- Useful databases are tax parcels, water distribution, sanitary sewer, and stormwater management
- Since the introduction of Pre-Application Meetings, a total of 23 meetings in 2021
- Adoption of the 2021 Comprehensive Plan
- A total of 21 site plans review applications were received with 31 site plan review meetings.





Transportation

- Downtown Master Plan Adopted by Council in 2021.
- Downtown Improvements Community Outreach and Preliminary Design 2022 with construction beginning in 2023.
- Roundabout NE Terre View Drive and NE Northwood Drive, Summer 2022. Project moving forward with successful Transportation Improvement Board grant award.
- Second Roundabout to be constructed Albion Road and State Route 27

THE FUTURE IS GREEN

- First two electric buses arrived Spring 2021 (80% grant funded) with a third bus arriving in summer 2022.
- Upgrades to Transit Bus facility to support fully electric buses (primarily grant funded).
- Recreation building solar array has saved 266,595 lbs. of CO2 emissions since Sept. 2020—equivalent to planting 2,014 trees.
- Waste Water Treatment Plant UV project minimize chemicals and associated hazards with disinfection.
- Per capita water demand continues to drop, supported by the City's conservation efforts.
- Working with Palouse Basin Aquifer Committee (PBAC) on sustainable, long-term water supply planning efforts.
- Launching Climate Sustainability Committee
- Declared a Tree City USA 25 years in a row by the Arbor Day Foundation, honoring commitment to urban forest management.
